

Over the Counter Products

- Products that can be brought at pharmacies, supermarkets and shops for self-limiting problems they will heal or be cured on their own accord and can be managed with OTC products.
- In the year prior to June 2017, the NHS spent approximately £569 million on prescriptions for medicines, which could otherwise be purchased OTC.
- These prescriptions also include other common items: That can be purchased over the counter, sometimes at a lower cost than that which would be incurred by the NHS; For which there is little evidence of clinical effectiveness

Every £1m saved on prescriptions for over the counter treatments could fund (approx.)

- > 39 more community nurses; or
- > 270 more hip replacements; or
- ➢ 66 more drug treatment courses for breast cancer; or
- > 1000 more drug treatment courses for Alzheimer's; or
- > 1040 more cataract operations
